

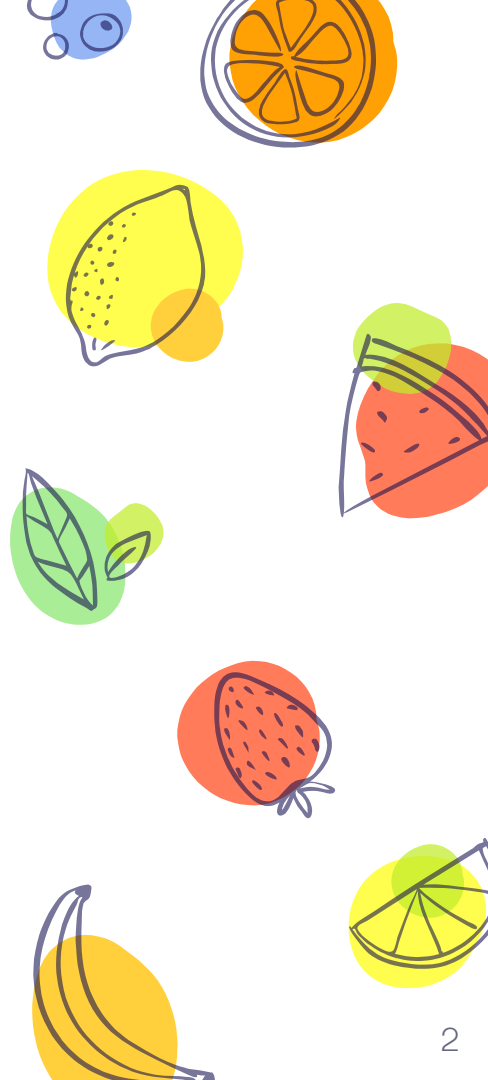

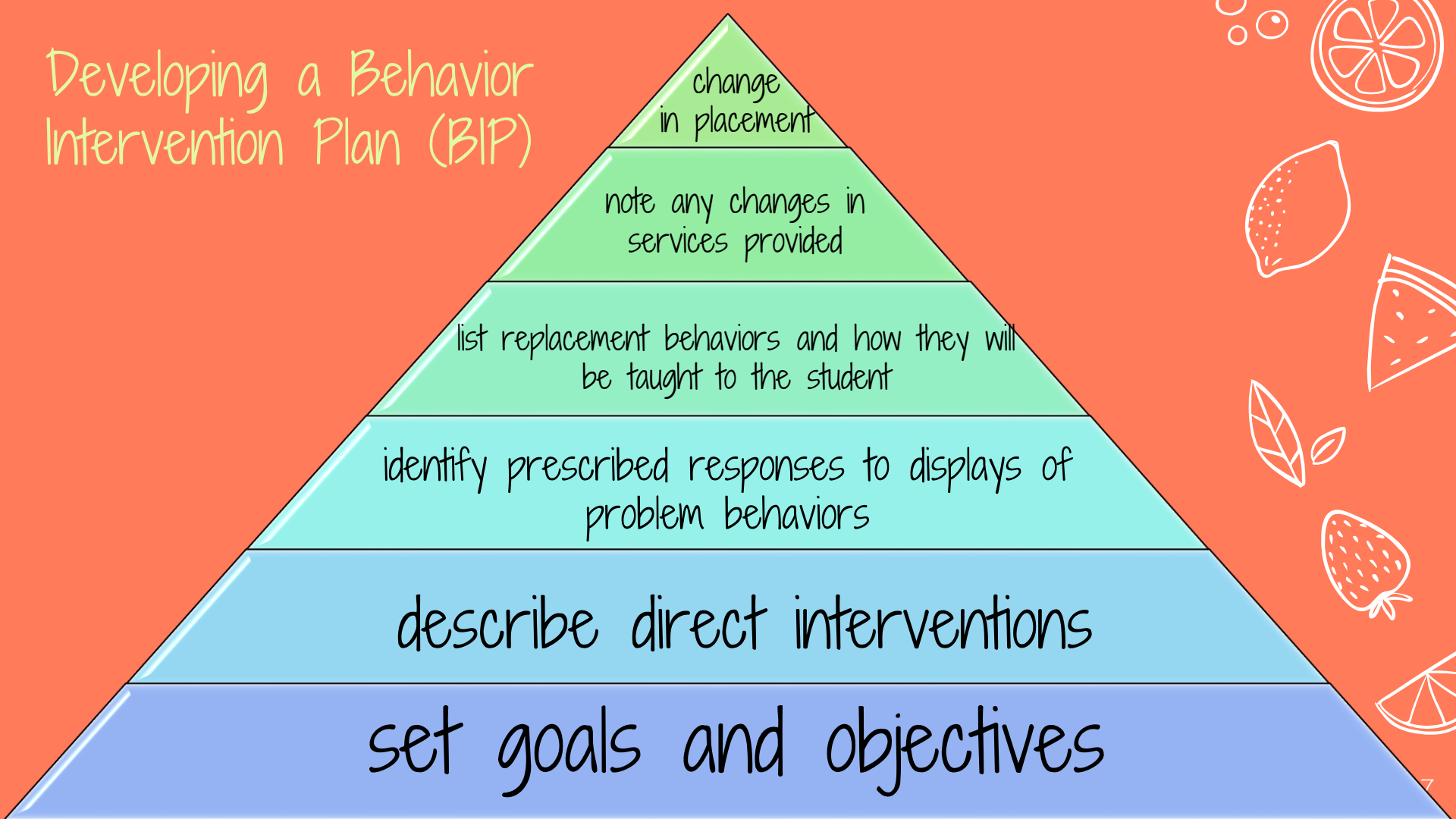

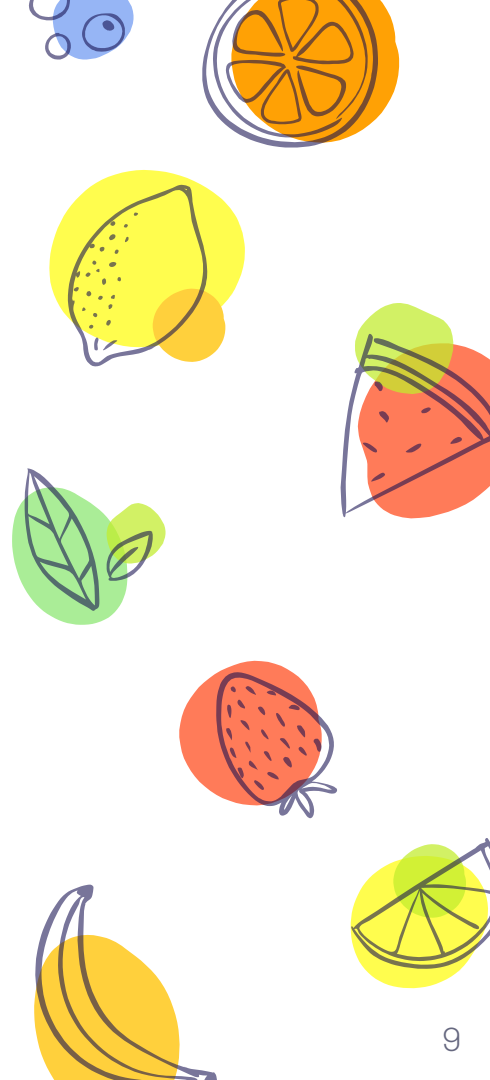

In the Beginning

As the PBIS team, it may fall to you to help get BIPs rolling.

IEP teams and counsloers will likely be involved, but you have to start somewhere.

First ask your school if you already use a BIP template.

If so, does it meet the TFI criteria?

Determine who will create the BIPs for existing FBAs.

Determine how teachers will be made aware of students using a BIP.

Planning for a BIP

Review the Recommended Strategies in the Plan

Determine how to include the strategies in your lesson planning.

2

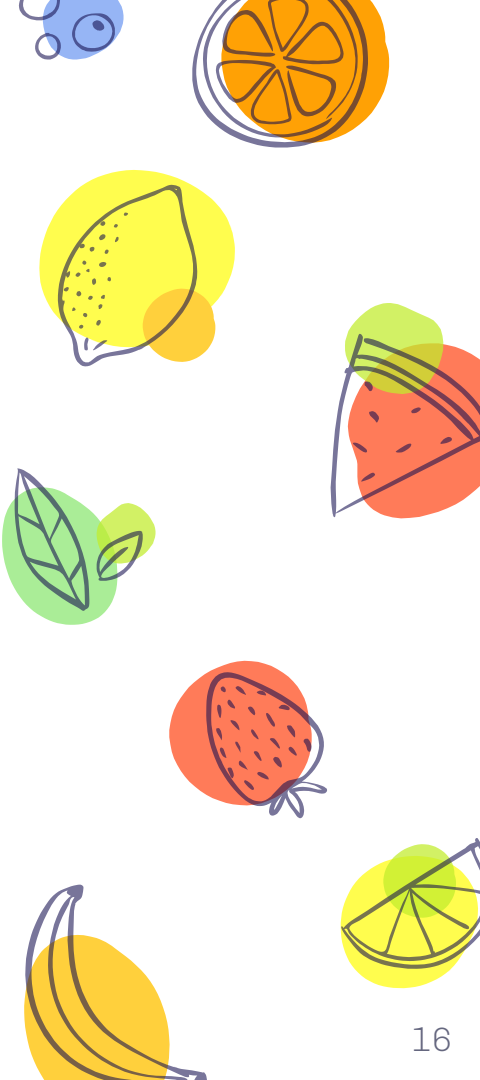
Make Necessary Adjustments

Ensure your classroom meets the needs of the student based on the BIP.

3

Implement the Interventions

Utilize the interventions in the plan, document and record relevant data.



Examples

- × CICO
- × Hot Pass
- × Chill Spot
- × Timers
- × Praise Ratio
- × Tangibles/ Incentives /Token
- × Passes Per Week
- × Seating
- × Pacing Zone
- × Headphones
- × Hand Raising
